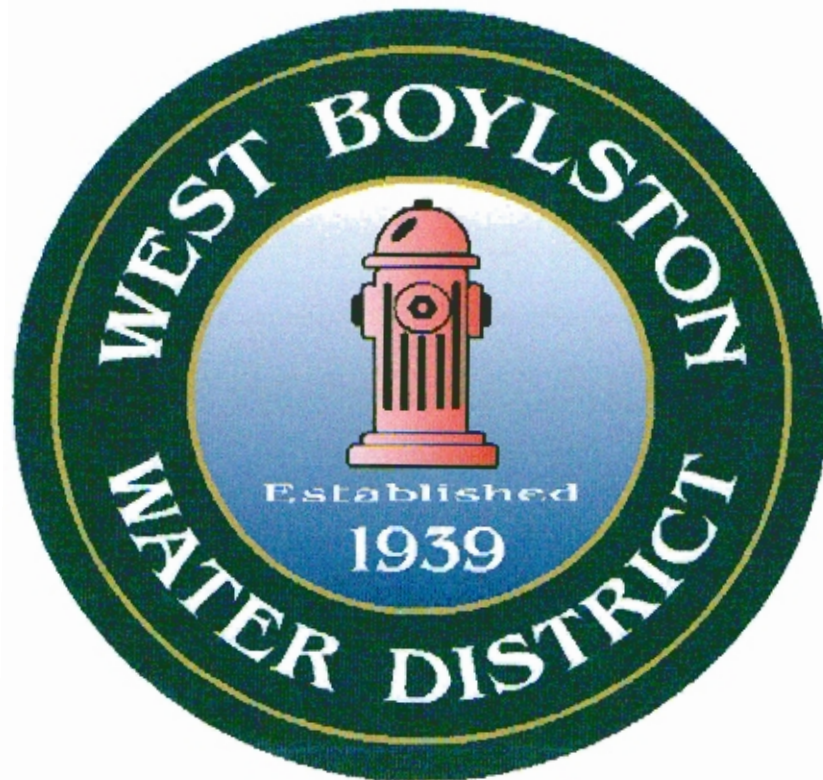

To the District Clerk of the West Boylston Water District of West Boylston, Massachusetts, in the County of Worcester,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the West Boylston Water District of West Boylston, qualified to vote in election and District affairs, to meet at the West Boylston Water District Office, 183 Worcester Street, West Boylston, in such District, on Monday the second day of June in the year of 2008 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1: To elect the following District Officers:

- (A) Moderator for one year
- (B) District clerk for one year

ARTICLE 2: To hear the report of the officers of the District and to act thereon.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to transfer from any unexpended balances of the fiscal year 2008 appropriations, hitherto made or other available funds to fiscal year 2008 appropriation accounts, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$1,160,852 for the maintenance and operating expenses for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008 and ending June 30, 2009 or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to authorize the District Treasurer with approval of the Commissioners, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the fiscal year July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009, in accordance with the Provisions of the General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, as amended, and to issue note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with the General Law, Chapter 44, Section 17 as amended, and to authorize the Treasurer to enter into a Compensating balance agreement or agreements for fiscal year 2007 pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 53F, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to appropriate from the Capital Account to continue with the meter replacement program, the sum of one hundred twenty thousand (\$120,000) dollars to purchase radio read water meters or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 7: Amend Article I, Section 4 of the District Bylaws (Quorum Requirement).

To see if the District will vote to amend Article I of its Bylaws, entitled "Meetings," by revising Section 4 thereof, which currently reads:

Section 4. Twenty or more legal voters shall constitute a quorum for action under any warrant; provided that a number of less than a quorum may vote an adjournment.

to read as follows:

Section 4. Ten or more legal voters shall constitute a quorum for action under any warrant; provided that a number of less than a quorum may vote an adjournment.


or to take any other action relative thereon.

Report of the Water Commissioners
To the Citizens of
The West Boylston Water District
2008

In Compliance with the laws establishing the West Boylston Water District, the Board of Water Commissioners hereby submits its 69th Annual Report.

At the annual Town Election, held on April 1, 2008, unopposed candidate John S. Wilson was elected for a three year term. The following results were posted:

At the Annual Meeting of the District, held on June 2, 2008, Mr. David J. Sweetman was elected to a one-year term as moderator. In addition Mr. Robert Bryngelson was nominated and elected to the position of District Clerk.

As chairman of the West Boylston Water District Commission, it gives me great pleasure to provide the District Members with the Annual Report for 2008. The West Boylston Water District continues to make significant progress in its goal to provide you with the best quality of water at the most reasonable price. The Commission and the District staff have worked hard to keep your water rates level funded for 2008 given the anticipated downturn in the economy being forecast for 2009. District expenses continue to rise particularly in the areas of energy, health insurance costs, water treatment chemicals and supplies. The District continues to operate with a twenty percent full time staff reduction and will be utilizing part time help. Obviously this approach places greater responsibilities and work loads on the staff we have and we applaud them for their understanding and hard work.

The District continues to focus on the tightening of operating expenses while meeting its mandatory schedules for major system maintenance such as the cleaning of storage reservoirs and the upgrading of our pumping facilities. We continue to explore potential new sources of water for the District through ongoing meetings with our Legislators, the Department of Conservation and Recreation, the Department of environmental Protection and with our consulting engineers, Tata & Howard. We are moving ever closer to making this need a reality. We are wrapping up a major water main improvement project on Laurel Street and are in the planning stages for some much needed improvements to our building facilities. The District was also able to secure a contract with additional new carriers on the communications towers on our reservoir sites. This will result in an additional \$20,000 per year in rental income for the District.

The District was awarded Third Place in the 2008 Massachusetts Rural Water Association's taste test contest. We have also made the following progress in our efforts to update our water system and provide the ratepayers with the best water quality possible.

- Shady Lane Loop - 120' of 8" DI - **Completed in 2008**
- Oakdale Tank Rehabilitation and upgrades - **Completed in 2008**
- Laurel Street booster pump – **scheduled completion in Summer 2009**
- Rte. 12 booster pump upgrade – **Bid and construct in 2009 –2010**
- Water Loss Prevention - \$30 thousand DEP grant for a leak survey and leak detection equipment – **Completed in 2008**
- Oakdale Well Cleaning and Rehabilitation – **Completed in 2008**
- Oakdale and Pleasant Valley Wells – Motor and Pump upgrades – **Completed in 2008**
- Rehabilitation of Lawrence St. Tank access road – **Completed in 2008**

In closing, on behalf of the staff of the West Boylston Water District and the Board of Water Commissioners I would once again like to extend our deepest gratitude to the District Superintendent, Michael Coveney, and our staff, for the outstanding support they provide to the West Boylston Water District and our citizens.

SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT TO THE DISTRICT 2008

Members of the West Boylston Water District, I hereby submit to you my fifth annual report as Superintendent. I have had the pleasure of working for the District for eight years now, starting as a water operator in 2001 and becoming Superintendent in 2004. This brief report will reflect some of the issues the District has experienced through the Year of 2008.

The District still continues to grow with several new developments over the last few years including Angell Brook Village, Old Century Farm and Afra Terrace. These developments when completed will add a total of approximately 200 new customers to the system. There are also other developments that are proposed for the North Main and Franklin Street areas. We will continue to follow these closely as we grow.

The water consumption of the District has been reduced to a more comfortable level of that is currently below our registered withdrawal amount. Congratulations to those of you who have been conserving, keep up the good work as it really does take some of the burden away from the system. Although we are below our registered withdrawal by 2% we still need to maintain the mandatory outdoor water restrictions.

The Oakdale Well continues to maintain a high level of Manganese. This element that has been occurring naturally within the ground and is one of the top priority concerns of the District. We have been limiting the use of this well to only a few hours each day to try lower the manganese levels in the system. The search for a new source to replace the Oakdale Well is ongoing and we are very limited to the areas that are available by the State controlled lands (DCR). We will continue our search and keep in close contact with the DCR and DEP as also mentioned in the report of the Water Commissioners. We are also considering a treatment plant to remove the manganese and a possible interconnection with a neighboring community to ease the demand.

The Laurel Street booster pump station contract has been substantially completed and is currently online and being used. This station services the upper end of Laurel Street and greatly improves both the domestic and fire protection water flows and pressures for that area as they have below minimum standards since the construction of I-190. A project closeout and final completion is scheduled for 2009.

The Meter Replacement Program is ongoing. We have replaced 1600 meters out of a total of 2500 so far, using our own staff. This is a very large project and could take several years to complete. In the end the District will have a modern metering system, which will also reduce our unaccounted for water and allow us to better comply with our water withdrawal registration. We will be working in all areas of the District, so please take notice of your water meter and service line and contact us if you have any concerns.

In the year of 2008 with the purchase of the appropriate equipment, through a grant that was awarded to us from the DEP, we conducted a system wide leak survey by utilizing our own staff to handle this task. We were able to identify 15 possible locations that could be leaking. Of those locations 8 were located and repaired immediately and the remaining seven will be pinpointed and repaired in 2009. We also repaired two major water breaks one on the Franklin St. 8" high pressure main and one on the 6" main on

Valley Forge Circle. several other small service leaks. Due to the age of the system and its construction this will probably be a concern of the District for many years to come.

Some other projects that deserve mention for 2008 are as follows:

1. The Rehabilitation and upgrade of the Oakdale (Beaman St.) Water Tank which included a complete relining of the interior of the tank, the installation of an exterior ladder and a new access hatch and guardrail at the top of the tank and an alarm system for intrusions.
2. The pump and motor upgrades to the Pleasant Valley and Oakdale Wells, along with the cleaning of the Oakdale Well.
3. The Shady Lane loop to Horseshoe Drive eliminating a dead end and allowing for a looped system for better redundancy.
4. The Rehabilitation of the Lawrence Street Tanks access roadway which helped alleviate some of the drainage issues and road debris that was being carried down onto Lawrence Street.

The District continues to maintain a website which is always accessible for information, I encourage you to take a look at www.westboylstonwater.org for any questions that you may have. We are also in the process of developing an online payment system for the water bills which should be available in 2009.

The District has and will continue to provide a consistent high quality service to its members. We maintain three (3) wells, four (4) storage tanks, over 56 miles of pipeline ranging from a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch service up to a 16" transmission main, over 400 fire hydrants, close to 1,000 main valves and over 2500 water meters. The daily staff consists of a Superintendent, Foreman, Water Operator, Laborer, Secretary, part-time Assistant and part-time summer laborer.

In conclusion I wish to thank our District Staff of Karen Bernstein, John Flanagan, Rob Lopez, Mary Gaffney, Joe Carlson and Kevin Bjorkland. They have been a pleasure to work with and I commend them for their loyalty, dedication and professionalism. I also wish to thank the District Treasurer Heather Isaacs and the Board of Commissioners both past and present for their guidance. And mostly I want to thank you, the members of the District, for your patience, understanding and support.

WATER**CONSERVATION****TIPS**

The District has mandatory outdoor water use restrictions we ask you to help by conserving water. You'll be surprised at how much you can save without hardship right in your own home. Water conservation is a good way of life. Let's practice it together:

- If you have an irrigation system for your lawn, please be sure that the watering corresponds to the allowed times and also consider installing a rain sensor which shuts the system off when it is not needed.
- Showers can take less water than baths, but not if you spend 10 to 20 minutes in the shower. Since most showers pour out between 5 to 10 gallons per minute, that can add up in a hurry. It's more a matter of self-control. A partially filled tub or a shorter shower will no doubt use less water. Time yourself next time, the odds are you really don't need to stand that that long nor do you need the shower running the whole time.
- When shaving and brushing your teeth, try not to leave the water running. Run as much as you need, then turn off the tap until you need some more. It adds up to a whole lot of wasted water.
- A little leak can go a long way. Just a slow drip can waste up to 15 to 20 gallons a day! Worn washers and leaky toilets cause most leaks. Check your faucets and toilets at least once a year.
- Many washing machines use 40 gallons of water for a load whether you have them stuffed full or with only a few items. Save up for a full load and make your water work more efficiently. Or remember to set your machine for a lesser load if it can be adjusted. You may also want to consider a more energy efficient front loader which uses less than half of the water of a top loading machine.
